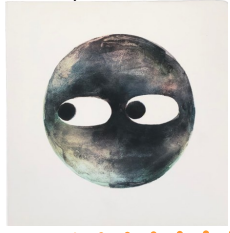

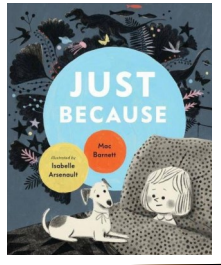

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LITERACY BEGINS AT BIRTH!

When children look at picture books before they can read the words on the page, they are working on important skills that lead to reading. Reading the same book over and over helps children connect spoken words to the text on the page.

Reading Tips

- Go on a letter scavenger hunt. Encourage your child to find every letter.
- When you read to your child, ask questions about what might happen in the story.
- Talk with your child about the author and illustrator of the books you read together.
- Let your child see you reading. Talk about why you enjoy reading.
